A new kitchen breaks with the trend of open living space and delights with classic style

any homeowners today share the desire to connect their kitchen to their living spaces. In new homes, this often manifests as a great room. (In remodels, this usually means walls are knocked down.) Jean and Ellen's colemial New England home had a great room, but they didn't like it at all.

separation is desired.





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


